GARDENING NOTES AND NEWS

John Leigh Park is a great outdoor space to have on our doorstep. Some like to play tennis or bowls, some come to see the birds, have a swing and a slide. For others it's a place to walk the dog or meet and have a chat.

For me it's a place to garden. I joined the gardening team earlier this year and I am really enjoying the enthusiasm and energy we share in looking after the plants in the park.

This year we moved some plants around to make space for those we want to see more of. We have got rid of ugly plants. And we have done our best to nurture the plants we like.

Our biggest success is probably the wildflowers pictured here. They have been great for colour and smell. They attracted so many pollinators you could hear the buzz around the meadow throughout the summer. Recently we removed the grass from the edge of the meadow so it can expand and develop a more natural shape.



But it has not always been easy in the gardens. Thank you for your support in trying to save the plants on the octagonal bed. It helped a lot although all is not well around the Red Robin tree. You may have noticed the box hedges looking worse for wear. They are being attacked by a caterpillar from Southeast Asia. If you carefully inspect the hedge, you can see them. They have black heads, dark green bodies and black lines running along their length. If you find one, pick it off and stamp on it.



Matthew and the Duke of Edinburgh Award volunteers have been working on getting rid of the box hedge moth caterpillars. One young man took out 164, others 50 or more.







A pheromone trap has been set to catch male moths.

Some hedges have lost their leaves, but some are still looking good. We are not sure it is a battle we will win.

Although the council do a great job maintaining the lawns and keeping the trees safe for us to walk under, they do not have the resources to look after the gardens in our park. Maintaining and improving the gardens is done by us - we who use the park.

Gardening is one of the most enjoyable and fulfilling activities you can do in John Leigh Park. So, whether your passion is for creation, care, conservation or conversation come and join us in the garden. You can help with design, planting, maintenance or make the tea. We meet Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 9am, and Saturday mornings from 10am – 11am. No experience required.

Celebration- Jamming In The Park and The Mayor of Trafford's Visit.







For the most part the park has been a setting for people to make their own entertainment through the summer as the constraints of the covid pandemic have, quite properly, meant that organised events for any number of people have not been allowed. By the end of July and again in early September we felt confident enough to offer musical sessions: 'Jamming in the park' on two Sunday afternoons. These were approved by Trafford MBC's Events Team. 'Jamming' is built around Alan Rydout and his musical friends and associates: Jon, Ben, Michael, Mike& John (Oldplay), Recycled, The Guestlist and Rob.

Both occasions were blessed with sunshine and there was a fabulous turnout of about 200 each time. On September 5th the Mayor of Trafford – Councillor Laurence Walsh and the Mayoress, visited the park in the swish Mayoral car – driven by a smartly dressed chauffeur. The Mayor walked with us up to the Hartley Road Gateway to appreciate the refurbishment which has been funded by Trafford MBC and local people, including the Seamons Moss Community Association. The gateway was decorated in celebratory balloons for the occasion. These were kindly supplied by Mandy of Balloon Castle in Timperley.

The Mayor and Mayoress entered fully into the spirit of the occasion, walking round the park and congratulating us on its beauty, the range of activities it supports and the spectrum of people using the park that afternoon. Councillor Walsh joined the bands at the microphone and shared well made comments.
